Round 1 Lottery Results

Families can log in to their My School DC family accounts at MySchoolDC.org to access their lottery results. If assistance is needed logging into accounts, please call the My School DC Hotline at (202) 888-6336. My School DC is able to provide login assistance, as well as lottery results.

Round 1 Enrollment Deadline: May 1, 2015

Students who are matched through Round 1 of the lottery have until May 1st, 2015 to enroll at their matched school. If they are not enrolled at their matched school by May 1st, they will lose their seat at that school. A parent or legal guardian must enroll the student in person, at the school. They will need to prove DC residency, complete any additional paperwork required by the school, and submit a My School DC Enrollment Form (which the school will have on file).

Note: Enrolling at a school does not remove a student from any [waitlist](#) he or she is on.

Round 2 Lottery Application Deadline: May 8, 2015

If a student was not matched to a school in Round 1 of the lottery OR if a student missed the Round 1 deadlines to apply, they can [apply](#) in [Round 2](#) of the lottery. Round 2 works the same way as Round 1. Applicants can apply to up to 12 schools and will rank their schools in order of preference. DC Mayor's Office on Asian and Pacific Islander Affairs

The Mayor's Office on Asian and Pacific Islander Affairs offers a Language Bank that will connect volunteers with Asian language abilities with District Agencies. The purpose of this Language Bank is to supplement the efforts of Agencies in providing language services. When and while professional services are being procured there are often language services that need to still be addressed. The Language Bank is one way this gap can be fulfilled.

How it works:

OAPIA will solicit and maintain a database of individuals who express interest

in providing their language skill to the District. The individuals will self-identify their language qualifications. District Agencies will register with OAPIA in order to have access to the database. Once registered, they will be able to submit Jobs to OAPIA who will send the jobs out to the list of registered volunteers. If there is a match, OAPIA will connect the two parties and the Agency can provide additional details and logistics as needed.

For Volunteers:

Individuals who have a language specialty interested in volunteering their time will complete a registration and language self-assessment questionnaire with OAPIA. If a volunteer find an assignment they are interested in, OAPIA will make the connection by only providing the name and email or phone of the volunteer. All other information will not be shared and be protected by OAPIA.
